TAN Update – August 2023

Congratulations on a Significant Milestone

For decades, later-life learners in the Greater Toronto Area have searched for an organization where they could enjoy a range of lectures from accomplished and lively speakers. For 50 years, thousands of these inquiring minds have found what they sought at Living and Learning in Retirement (LLIR), where fascinating and timely topics are offered up in a friendly, environment that encourages and supports discussion and socialization. Year after year, inspired LLIR members return to the organization, bringing with them like-minded friends and making LLIR popular and membership in demand.

This year LLIR celebrates its 50th anniversary, along with the success of this popular, highly respected later-life learning organization, the dedication and hard work of its volunteers, and the loyalty of its members. The first such organization in Ontario, LLIR has served as a model for many other groups and its leadership has generously helped new later-life learning groups to get established in Toronto and beyond.

This spring, LLIR generously donated \$2000 to TAN to assist its efforts to make later-life learning available to more and more people across Ontario. This gift is very much welcomed and appreciated by TAN. It reflects LLIR's efforts to support more and better learning opportunities for Third Age learners. It also bolsters the volunteer efforts which make all our organizations viable. TAN is grateful for this generous support.

Making the Transition at Third Age Learning Guelph (TALG)

TALG had just finished its winter lecture series in March of 2020 when our world entered the Covid lockdown. From a 30-year history of providing live lecture series on the University of Guelph campus at the Arboretum we were faced with two choices. Adapt or shut down. Fortunately, we had some time between March and September to seek alternatives and adjust our plans. The Board struck a working group to explore options and by the end of May that group returned with the option of using an option called "Zoom Webinars" to offer our lectures "online". An internet search turned up several companies prepared to offer this service and after some evaluation and review we went with Canadian Webinar Solutions, based in Ottawa,

to offer the lecture series in the fall of 2020. The series was well received, our service provider proved to be effective and reliable, and our membership actually increased as people looked for educational stimulation options in the limited Covid opportunities.

By May of 2022 we again reached one of those infamous "tipping points". Covid vaccination had opened the possibility of "in person" lectures again and how would we address that when we now had an "Online" community who were still separated by distance, health concerns and transportation issues.

Again, the Board struck a working group to poll our membership and explore options. The membership survey came back with a 60% selection for in-person and a 40% vote for remaining online. With that as our mandate the working group decided to explore options for "hybrid" lectures, both streamed and in person. The critical search criteria were:

- 1) A turnkey operation. We didn't have tech skills to handle live streaming/recording by ourselves.
- 2) A physical site with seating to meet distancing yet still allow for 150+ in-person attendance
- 3) Parking and public transit access
- 4) Financially reasonable to allow us to continue at our current lecture fee schedule

After considering several options the working group signed a lease with Harcourt Memorial United Church in Guelph. We asked them to host us in their sanctuary, provide tech support for live streaming and engage in the behind the scenes work to send out the YouTube link each week to all of our registrants to allow them to either attend in person or on line as they choose,

We are now in our second "semester" of lectures from the church. The two fall lectures proceeded seamlessly thanks to the technical expertise of the church staff and their willingness to flex with us. We have been seeing about a 40% "in person" attendance (about 100 people) and 60% "online" (100-125 screens, 150-175 people) which was close to our survey results. Inclement weather sees movement online and away from travel, but, with everyone receiving the link the day before the lecture, that has proven to be an asset and a value added benefit for our members.

So far all of our lecturers have been "in person" but the technology allows for them to come from "off-site" and be presented on screen in the hall as well as viewed "on screen" for those at home, increasing the distance we can draw speakers from and proving a flexibility we didn't have on bad weather days.

Our informal reviews for this hybrid approach have been very positive, but we will do a more thorough review at the end of our first full year of offering this approach.

Transitions have proven to be stressful and challenging, but ultimately have pushed us to better service to our membership and richer opportunities. Now to see what the next transition brings.
